This past month we have been hard at work sharing our love of Northern Neck native plants. Five of us represented NNVNPS at the Master Gardener's Symposium on March 25th. The reception of those attending was heart-warming with so much interest in NNK native plants. We ran out of two packages of our Revised Native Plant Guides by lunch and had to call out for more! The speakers' messages were right on target too, stressing the importance of native plants to our native bees and other pollinators as well as healthy ecosystems and ecosystem services. If you haven't read Heather Holmes books, you are in for a real treat! I especially love *Pollinators of Native Plants – Attract, Observe and Identify Pollinators and Beneficial Insects with Native Plants*. I also highly recommend *Bees - An Identification and Native Plant Forage Guid*e which is a winner of four book awards. Visitors to our booth were delighted with our display and the small vials filled with the blooms of our Northern Neck native wildflowers.

Historic Garden Week in Northern Neck

Paula Boundy and Nancy Garvey represented our Chapter at Historic Garden Week in Warsaw on Wednesday, April 19th. They were delighted by the enthusiastic response to our Outreach Table and especially to Native Plants in general. They gave away over 60 Native Plant Guides, a real testament of the growing appeal and benefits of Growing NNK Natives!

Native Plant Identification and Field Class for Master Naturalist Trainees

I was delighted to lead a botany/native plant field trip with the help of Chapter member Anne Parker, to Hickory Hollow Natural Area Preserve as part of the Botany class for this year's Master Naturalist trainees.. The class of 16 students and mentors was especially enthusiastic and it was wonderful to share the fascinating life history of many rare and unusual plants that grow at Hickory Hollow and particularly at Cabin Swamp, a globally rare Plant Community type known as a Basic Seepage Swamp. The globally rare Basic Seepage Swamp at Hickory Hollow has base rich soils and extremely high levels of calcium from a number of seeps infiltrating down through ancient layers of shells and lime-sands. Did you know that Cabin Swamp is incredibly biodiverse with over 500 species of plants (many rare) and over 130 species of birds? Examples of Mountain Disjuncts in bloom were the lovely Marsh Marigolds, the statuesque False Green Hellebores and the Dog Violets, among many others. Animal diversity is directly connected to Plant biodiversity.













Spring Walk on Hickory Hollow Natural Area Preserve Sunday April 30th at 1:00pm

If you would like to take a walk in Hickory Hollow to see many of these wildflowers you are in luck! NNVNPS Members and their friends are invited to join us on a Spring Walk at Hickory Hollow next Sunday April 30th at 1:00 to learn about Hickory Hollow and its many rare and wonderful plants and spring wildflowers. We will hike down the White Trail which is fairly level and easy to the steep and narrow Cabin Swamp Trail that descends a steep ravine to the globally rare Basic Seepage Swamp, at Cabin Swamp. The Walk should take between 2 to 3 hours depending on how many wildflowers we stop to enjoy!

Bring sturdy shoes that can get a bit dirty and perhaps a walking stick and your camera and join us for a wonderful spring treat! Parking is limited so carpooling if possible is encouraged. PROPAGATION PROGRAM AND WORKSHOP ON APRIL 20TH

Both the program and workshop were a huge success! Experienced Propagator & Chapter Member Pat Lust presented a program on a variety of Propagation Techniques so that we can all now multiply our own native plants and contribute plants to our Fall Plant Sale. After the presentation, Pat taught a workshop to 13 eager participants. She was a masterful instructor and delighted us all with the amazing plants she shared with us. We planted tiny seeds of Cardinal Flower, Beebalm, Common Milkweed and American Bellflower, then moved onto transplant tiny seedlings of more wonderful natives, all being careful not to touch the stems, only handling the tiny plants by their leaves and roots. How delightful! Next we took stem cuttings of beautiful Black Chokeberries carefully clipping off the terminal leaves and buds and dipping the cut end into rooting hormone. Finally we divided Blue-eyed Grass and Green and Gold and carefully tucked them into new pots. What a splendid and productive afternoon! We can now all look forward to propagating many more plants from our own gardens and sharing them at the Fall Plant Sale. It is going to be better than ever! If you missed out, we are hoping we might entice Pat back to offer another workshop in the fall. Cross your fingers...

The Lancaster-Northumberland 5th Annual Butterfly Spring Count And Workshop

The Northern Neck Chapter of the VNPS will once again sponsor the Spring Butterfly Count in Lancaster and Northumberland Counties. The Count is part of the North American Butterfly Association held around the United States and the world. As most of you know, the vast majority of our butterflies depend on specific native plants with which they have co-evolved to lay their eggs and feed their caterpillars. The importance of regionally native plants is really spot-lighted on these Butterfly Counts. The data from these counts is extremely important to researchers that are assessing changes in butterfly populations especially in light of climate change. Plus we have observed many new records for butterflies not previously reported in our area.

If you are not familiar with our local butterflies, we have you covered. Jeff Wright, Count Coordinator and I will be offering a zoom workshop on Sunday evening June 11th and will cover how to identify a number of our butterflies and information about their native host plants and a bit about gardening to support butterflies. Look for more information in your local newspapers and in our member email announcements. The first of the summer butterfly Counts will be held in Essex, Westmoreland and Richmond Counties on June 27th.

Volunteers Needed to Help Pot Up Plants for the Fall Plant Sale and for the Strawberry Festival.

In addition we plan to pot up about 50 - 70-small pots of our native Virginia Strawberries for the Strawberry Festival on May 27th.

Membership Chair, Ellen Clarke, sent this report. "We have a large membership in the Northern Neck Chapter of the Virginia Native Plant Society. This month, we have around 192 members, including three new members who joined in March. Ten members are Life Members.

When I became Membership Chair in mid-2018, we had around 128 memberships. We seem to be getting the word out about our Chapter and about how important it is to include Virginia native plants in our gardens and yards. People are eager to attend our annual plant sale, read about the Plant of the Month in the newspaper, and easily attend our educational meetings on Zoom. I know that these activities have taught me so much about Virginia gardening. The weather is beautiful - let's get outside and plant natives!"

Indeed, it takes a village sometimes to make a difference so let's all volunteer for some of these fun events or get outside and help tend one of our demonstration gardens, propagate a few plants for our plant sale, or join us for a walk at Hickory Hollow.
