Happy National Pollinator Week, June 18 - 25! In celebration of National Pollinator Week we are planning a Special Event – the unveiling of a New Sign about the importance of Native Plants at the Kilmarnock Town Centre Park Garden at 10am, Friday June 23rd along with a tour of this cutting edge Sustainable Town Park.

The Kilmarnock Town Centre Park is a regional asset is so many ways - the Dog Park, the Half Shell Stage, the Splash Pad, the River Play kids water feature and all the events it hosts but one that is often overlooked is the sustainability merged in the park's construction. It incorporates impervious parking to reduce stormwater runoff, onsite stormwater management, energy-efficient building systems, and landscaping that includes extensive native plantings of bay friendly plants. Hats off to all the city employees with the long-term vision and commitment to make the park an example for all long into the future. And hats off to the Kilmarnock Town Council members who in 2014 voted to carry the park forward, and forward it came three years later.

Our Chapter Board discussed a few years ago with Kilmarnock, the need for a sign about Native plants because of the native plantings incorporated into the park. Finally, earlier this year we proceeded to create an appropriate sign and on Friday, June 23rd at 10 am, the Board and others will be dedicating a new sign about the importance of the native plants incorporated in the Town Centre Park.

This new sign is a collaborative effort between the Native Plant Society and the Friends of the Rappahannock River in celebrating our native Flora and all the biodiversity and ecological services they provide. It will complement the existing Friends of the Rappahannock River sign that explains the importance of managing Stormwater Runoff in protecting our rivers and the Bay and the innovative techniques used at the Kilmarnock Town Center Park.

The Town Centre Park, one of the demonstration gardens on the Northern Neck Chapter of Virginia's Native Garden Trail is a wonderful place to observe a diversity of native plants and how they can shine in the landscape. Besides the Park is one of the butterfly hot spots on our two Lancaster-Northumberland Butterfly Counts each year.

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Plan to join us next Friday to see the new sign and enjoy a tour of the Park with Kilmarnock Director of Planning, Marshall Sebra to learn about the beautiful and diverse plantings of native trees, shrubs and perennials and the five stormwater management swales filled with native plantings that capture and filter out most, if not all, of the stormwater and pollutants from the parking lot and buildings and allow them to soak in and recharge our underground reservoirs while protecting our streams, rivers and ultimately the Bay.

Strawberry Festival a Big Success!

Nancy Garvey, Queen of our Outreach Booth, wrote in to report that "the Strawberry Festival on Saturday, May 27th was about as perfect a day as anyone could ask for! The booth looked great and fellow volunteers Paula Boundy, Judy Lang, Andy Bailey, and Gary Chafin were wonderful to work with and she couldn't have done it without them! Our booth gave away more than 50 of our Native Plant Guides and many of the other complimentary handouts on the table. There were people at our booth asking for information from the time the festival opened until at least 2 when the crowds started clearing out. Fourth Annual Spring Butterfly Count Once Again is Sponsored by our Northern Neck Chapter

The Fourth Annual Northumberland-Lancaster County Spring Butterfly Count took place on Thursday, June 1. Count Coordinator, Jeffrey Wright reports, "Each year the Counts have documented several species never before reported for Northern Neck, greatly expanding our knowledge of butterflies and their distribution in the Northern Neck and adds so much to our knowledge of butterflies and the plants they rely on."

This Spring Count is sponsored by the Northern Neck Native Plant Society. You may ask what the connection is between native plants and butterflies? The answer is that many butterflies as well as bees and other pollinators require very specific native host plants for their young caterpillars. Female butterflies search for these specific native plants to lay their eggs on and may only have a few days or weeks to find them. Without these native plants the young of many butterflies (and many native bees) are not able to survive. These Counts have shown that public and private gardens, schools, and other venues filled with Northern Neck native plants

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such as Shiloh School or Town Centre Park in Kilmarnock support a bounty of butterflies and are favored sites for both butterflies and Count volunteers to explore.

Participating in the Butterfly Counts is loads of fun and a wonderful way to contribute to citizen science. It's also a great chance to get outside and enjoy beautiful gardens, parks, and natural areas with nature enthusiasts. The next Northumberland-Lancaster Summer Count will be held July 26. A 'George Washington Birthplace Butterfly Count" will be held in Essex, Richmond, and Westmoreland Counties on June 21.
